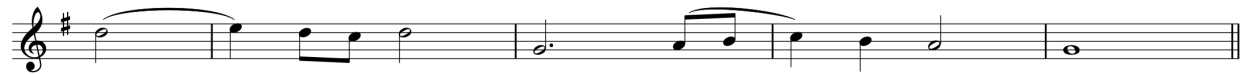

We welcome organist **David Schrader** to our worship this morning! In addition to his nationally recognized career as an organist with orchestras such as the Dallas and San Francisco Symphony Orchestras—and frequently with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra—Mr. Schrader was, for 35 years, a member of the faculty of Roosevelt University, Chicago College of Performing Arts. His extensive discography ranges from Bach to Barber, and from Vivaldi to Colgrass (his 2021 album “Organ Music By Frank Ferko & Leo Sowerby” features the music of former SPR Director of Music, Frank Ferko). For 35 years, Mr. Schrader also served as the organist of the Church of the Ascension (Chicago). Mr. Schrader’s additions to our All Saints’ Sunday are made possible through contributions to the SPR Music Fund.

About This Week’s Music

It took composer and organist Maurice Duruflé nearly six years to complete his *Requiem*. Although a recognized expert—he was also a professor at the Paris Conservatory—he lived a life full of self-doubt, and suffered from an acute lack of self-confidence (what we call “imposter syndrome”). The result was a catalogue of only eleven published scores, many of which center liturgical themes and texts. Duruflé spent much of his young life in a choir school at the Rouen Cathedral, and, as a result, was deeply influenced by Gregorian chant, which serves as the basis for his *Requiem* (“Truly,” said his wife, “he had a Gregorian soul”). The work was premiered via French radio broadcast on All Souls’ Day, November 2, 1947. “This *Requiem* is entirely composed on the Gregorian themes of the *Mass for the Dead*,” he wrote. “Sometimes the musical text was completely respected ... sometimes I was simply inspired by it or left it completely. In general, I have sought above all to enter into the characteristic style of the Gregorian themes.” And so, Duruflé has given us a lush, harmonically rich setting of chant that was never meant to have harmonic support: a juxtaposition with extraordinary results. In his own program note, the composer wrote, “This *Requiem* is not an ethereal work which sings of detachment from earthly worries. It reflects, in the immutable form of the Christian prayer, the agony of one faced with the mystery of their ultimate end. It is often dramatic, or filled with resignation, or hope or terror, just as the words of the Scripture themselves, which are used in the liturgy ... *In Paradisum* [marks] the ultimate answer of Faith to all the questions by the flight of the soul to Paradise.” Today’s **postlude** is by Jehan Alain, a friend and colleague of Maurice Duruflé who would have undoubtedly established himself as a leading French composer had his life not been cut short by service in the second World War. Also based on plainsong chant, “Litanies” contains a header quotation pertaining to the death of Alain’s sister in 1937, the year in which it was written: “When the Christian soul is in distress and cannot find any fresh words to implore God’s mercy, it repeats the same prayer unceasingly with overwhelming faith. The limit of reason is past. It is faith alone which propels its ascent.”
