



It is right to give our thanks and praise.


God, thank you for making the earth and all that is in it.

You made the universe and you made people; you gave the universe the gift of chance and you gave people the gift of free will. Then you saw how we have ignored what is good and true, and how we forget your rules and your love. And so sin and pain entered the world. And so you decided to give us another gift.

On this holy night, you sent us Jesus Christ, born of his mother Mary, who was fully God and fully human. Even when Jesus was born, he saved us. In all parts of his life, he showed us how to live. And when Jesus gave his life up freely on the cross, he saved us all. And then, on the third day, Jesus rose again, alive in a new way. Jesus defeated death. Thank you, God, for that first Easter Day, when his friends learned that Jesus is with us always, and nothing can take him away from us.

But on the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper, he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Recalling now his suffering and death, and celebrating his resurrection and ascension, we await his coming in glory. Accept, O Lord, our sacrifice of praise, this memorial of our redemption. Send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts. Let them be for us the Body and Blood of your Son. And grant that we who eat this bread and drink this cup may be filled with your life and goodness, being filled with the Holy Spirit so that the whole world may remember you.

All this we ask through our Redeemer, Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and for ever. **Amen.**


As our Savior Christ has taught us, we now pray:





About This Evening's Music

Although the Ukranian folk tune Shchedryk ("bountiful evening") was originally a song meant to celebrate the New Year, American composer Peter Wilhowsky crafted lyrics for an English-speaking audience, and it has become what we now know as "Carol of the Bells." In 1909, the English folk song collector Cecil Sharp went into the market town of Chipping Campden in Gloucestershire, England There, he recording a woman named Mary Clayton, who sang the song "The Holly and the Ivy," which became the first publication of the offertory anthem. The postlude by James Vivian is a setting of the medieval German carol, who text is attributed to the German mystic Heinrich Seuse. According to folklore, Seuse heard angels sing the words he penned, and joined them in a dance of worship.

Children & Youth at SPR

Nursery, 9:00am-12:00pm
