2023 ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES

- 10:45 AM: The annual meeting was called to order by warden Twila Jones. Rector Catherine Healy opened the meeting with prayer.
- 10:46 AM: Minutes of the 2022 annual meeting were approved, as distributed in the annual report.
- 10:48 AM: The vestry slate for three-year terms (Joshua Daniel, Anne Harlan, and Andrew Rostan) and appointments for one-year terms (Adetayo Adegoke for treasurer and Baiju Markose for clerk) were presented. The floor was opened for additional nominations.
- 10:50 AM: Rector Catherine Healy presented the stewardship report on 2022 annual giving.
- 10:55 AM: Treasurer Adetayo Adegoke reported on 2022 financials and investments.
- 11:05 AM: Wardens Twila Jones and Frances Spaltro presented the 2023 budget and answered questions.
- 11:20 AM: Rector Catherine Healy and wardens Twila Jones and Fran Spaltro thanked outgoing vestry members. Parishioners were thanked for their involvement in SPR's many ministries.
- 11:30 AM: The floor was closed for further vestry nominations. There were no nominations from the floor. The slate was unanimously approved.
- 11:35 AM: The meeting was adjourned by warden Frances Spaltro.

2024 VESTRY NOMINATIONS



Nathan Petrie (for a 3-year term to vestry)

Nathan is originally from the Cincinnati suburbs and earned a master's degree in nineteenth-century British literature from the University of Kentucky. After a stint as (variously) detail cleaner, communications assistant, youth group leader, and deacon in a multi-site Southern Baptist church, he moved to Chicago in 2020 to manage publicity for the University of Chicago Press' books in religious studies, philosophy, and medieval studies. He spends more time than he should thinking about board games, Star Wars, and The Lord of the Rings. Nathan is married to Lori Petrie. They live in Hyde Park.

Our stewardship theme for 2024, "Joyful Future," says it all: We have a joyful future ahead of us, and all the plans we make now will help us to realize it.

Connection | Creation | Community

As we prepare for the years to come at SPR, we are investing in three key strategic areas:

- **Connection:** Formation and fellowship ministries that invite each of us into a deeper knowledge of God and one another.
- **Creation:** Music, writing, and arts ministries that invite creative expression. There is a place for everyone at SPR to create something beautiful that gives glory to God.

ASSOCIATE RECTOR'S REPORT

2023 was another joyful year of worshipping together as a community. Sharing our lives with each other, receiving the sacraments, making music, and hearing the scriptures have been some of the most satisfying aspects of my time at SPR.

Last year's Pentecost service, which comprised of readings and prayers in sixteen languages, read by eighteen lectors, speaks to the richness of our diversity. It was an honor to coordinate with all the lectors in the service.

Another highlight of 2023 was planning Naomi Haynes' 100th birthday party. It was such a joy to come together and celebrate and honor Naomi and her family. Naomi's faith and joy are contagious and have deeply touched many of us.

In the summer of last year, we were made aware of the needs of migrants arriving in Chicago and sleeping on the floors of local police stations. Visiting the police stations and temporary shelters in empty warehouses was a humbling experience. I am so grateful to SPR for taking this need seriously and supporting the migrants in different ways. I'm extremely grateful for those who gave time and energy to lead this effort and are continuing in this ministry. I enjoyed partnering with all the staff and ministry teams for programming and special events. It was an honor to be part of Vacation Bible Camp, Haiti Sunday, and other programs, including special liturgical services for Holy Week and Christmas. It was also a great learning experience leading one of the Lenten small groups on Resurrection Hope, by Kelly Brown Douglas.

On the administrative side, I was glad we were able to have a smooth functioning of our day-to-day operations. In the fall, we sought to upgrade our database management software. Over the last few months, we've been hard at work transitioning to a new database system, which we hope will improve our efficiency and also open new ways for parishioners to connect with the church in 2024.

I'm grateful to all my colleagues for their support through the past year. I'm thankful to Lukasz for his years of service. I'm grateful to Tony for stepping in to help with sexton work. Many thanks also to Catherine, Mark, Lindsey, and Megan for being amazing colleagues! Lastly, I'm thankful to Twila and Fran for their continual support and encouragement as wardens.

2023 DIRECTOR OF MUSIC'S REPORT

Music at SPR creates opportunities for elevating worship, building community, and promoting our radical hospitality through inclusive programming, joyful fellowship, and barrier-free participation. Whether a staff singer, life-long member, or a visitor from the neighborhood, the music program seeks to engage all who enter the doors of SPR.

Megan Cather continued in her role as Children's Music Assistant, leading the St. Nicholas Choir on a weekly basis and directing the Christmas pageant in December. I am so grateful to Megan for her exceptional continued leadership in this role.

Ariana Strahl, Ian Murrell, and Savannah Hegyi have continued as staff singers, while Dennis Kalup resigned his position in October of 2023. We have welcomed Wesley Krist as a long-term substitute since October, while we complete a search for a permanent staff tenor to start February 1. I am pleased to report that this exceptionally skilled and good-natured roster will continue into 2024.

It has been a true pleasure to join the community of musicians that volunteer regularly to sing in both the Adult Choir and the Choristers. The opportunity to lead such a skilled and dedicated group is a consistent highlight of my week, and I am energized by the opportunities that lie ahead of us. I am also grateful to those SPR members who are not in the choir, but who have supported by sharing their words of encouragement, by facilitating their Chorister's involvement, or by donating to the Music Fund.


I continue to be intentional about incorporating the Choristers in a more prominent way within our worship service. This talented and energetic group have sung unique anthems or been featured as leaders on a regular basis within our worship, and have taken on extra leadership roles during our Christmas Eve, Ash Wednesday, and Maundy Thursday services, alongside their weekly contributions with the Adult Choir. The Choristers have tripled in number from when I began in the fall of 2022, and I love being faced with the weekly problem of "Where does everyone sit?" every Sunday morning. I have also continued writing a blurb in the bulletin, "About This Week's Music," which I hope offers context for the 'who' and the 'why' of programming selections.

In 2023, we had several major musical events inside and outside our Sunday morning worship. In June, we offered Carol Barnett's The World Beloved: A Bluegrass Mass, which brought in a 5-piece string band and featured the Adult Choir as well as the Choristers. On September 23, we held our first Justice Choir event. SPR is now the home for the Chicago chapter of this national organization, in partnership with Chicago Artists for Action. Our All Saints Sunday featured Maurice Duruflé's Requiem with guest organist David Schrader, and in December, we continued our annual tradition of a joint Advent Lessons & Carols service with St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Park Ridge, IL. A combined choir of over 50 members, along with lectors from SPR, and the Rev. Catherine Healy offered this service on December 10, 2023 at SPR. The service will return to Park Ridge in December of 2024.

Our Christmas Eve services featured the Choristers, Adult Choir, volunteer instrumentalists, and a pop-up choir, which offered folks a no-barrier opportunity to join the choir for our 5:00 PM Christmas Eve service.

Below are some graphics to offer insight into the choral music programmed in 2023. As is shown, my interest in works by living composers and my effort to diversify our choral library with minoritized voices is a guiding force in the music program's output. Utilizing the resource of our vast library, while also stewarding the financial resources which allow us to purchase new music reflecting our current time and place, is a weekly calculation I take very seriously. I am proud of our financial investment in the work of minoritized voices, and we will continue to seek out, and invest in more music by femaleidentifying and BIPOC composers in the upcoming year.

(Please note: this data is exclusive to choral anthems, and does not include congregational hymns, service music, or instrumental music such as preludes and postludes. It also does **NOT** include The Oxford Book of Choral Music by Black Composers, which includes 35 anthems by Black composers, seven of those by Black female-identifying composers.)



Looking into 2024, we will be presenting our weekend worship with Marques Garrett (rescheduled from January), and we will be leading at least one more Justice Choir event. I am actively working to offer our space for outside organizations to use. To that end, we will be hosting the College of St. Scholastica for a concert on March 9 and March 10 in our worship, and the Chicago-based group commonpulse in the summer for their annual concert series. Alongside these large-scale projects, we will continue to offer music that elevates and intersects with our lectionary, we will engage our youth and adults in music-making activities, and we will use our resources of skills, energy, and joy to deepen our music program at SPR.

I am so grateful to Megan Cather for her exceptional leadership as the Children's Music Assistant.

2023 CHILDREN'S MUSIC ASSISTANT'S REPORT

The children's music ministry includes the St. Nicholas Choir, which provides opportunities for children from preschool through grade 2 to nurture their spirituality through singing and gain foundations of music-making, as well as the Choristers program for grades 3-8 (led by director of music Mark Bilyeu and further discussed in his report). The St. Nicholas Choir meets in weekly rehearsals and performs in church services roughly once every three weeks. This ministry also includes children's chapel, the annual Christmas pageant, Christmas caroling, and the music program at Vacation Bible Camp.

In the 2023 program year, the children's music ministry was involved in various activities for families and children. The St. Nicholas Choir rehearsed and performed from January through June, and then again from September through December. In September, we welcomed a few new young singers, and saw the return of many singers from the previous year. Rehearsals and performances have had consistent high turnout. The children led singing weekly in services during Lent and sang spiritual songs at Vacation Bible Camp in August. This December, the children participated in the annual Christmas pageant.

In the coming year, I hope to continue to nurture a love of music among our robust group of singers in the St. Nicholas Choir.

As we have many younger singers, I hope to continue to bring a spirit of play into our rehearsals through vocal exercises, physical movement, and storytelling. I will coordinate with Mark Bilyeu for recommendations on how to develop our older singers to prepare them for singing with the Choristers as well. I will work with our older singers to ensure they have opportunities to lead the younger ones and find appropriate challenges in their own musical development. Finally, I will continue to work with Lindsey Strieter to incorporate music into children's programming, especially Vacation Bible Camp.

I am thankful to so many people for their support in this work. First, I am grateful for the parents and guardians of the St. Nicholas Choir singers, who build our rehearsals into their weekly schedules. Also, I am thankful for the guidance from Mark Bilyeu and the Rev. Catherine Healy in this important work. Thank you also to Lindsey Strieter for working closely with me in Children's Chapel and other children's ministries. Many people helped with this year's Christmas pageant, including the parents and guardians of the participating children, Cynthia Bagrowski, and youth leader Jen Jackson and the youth group members, who helped to sort costumes and cue the children. Thank you to everyone for your support!

2023 CHILDREN'S

CHILDREN'S & YOUTH FORMATION REPORT

This is my second year as the director of children's formation at SPR, and I continue to be grateful for the great team of people I work with: both the staff, and everyone who volunteers their time to either tell a story or support one of the groups. Here are some updates on our programming.

Vacation Bible Camp

VBC 2023 was a great success. We had 27 kids in attendance. No one got injured! I had a great group of volunteers who helped make the whole week so successful, including 10 counselors – maybe a record!

Godly Play (preschool to grade 2)

We continue to share Bible stories from the Montessori-inspired Godly Play curriculum with this age group, incorporating additional activities from an Episcopal curriculum called Weaving God's Promises. Our average attendance for this group is 8.

Junior Youth Group (grades 3 to 5)

This age group engages actively with Bible stories through skits, games, and more. At present, they are preparing to act out the Parable of the Good Samaritan (with some artistic freedom) for the Godly Play children. Our average attendance for this group is 5.

Youth Group (grades 6 to 12)

The youth group has continued to take part in different service projects and collaborations. They made another trip to the Greater Chicago Food Depository this fall. Per their request, they also made crafts for cats and dogs for an animal shelter here in Chicago. They also collaborated with artist and parishioner Levi Smith to add to the Advent wreath hanging in our sanctuary. They have more service projects on the schedule, including one with La Rabida Children's Hospital. Our average attendance for this group is 9. And once again, I cannot thank Jen Jackson enough for volunteering her time to lead the youth group.

Tell Me the Truth About Racism

I am lucky to have Amanda Ruch and Celia Paris leading this anti-racism series for children and youth (grades 1 and up). The Godly Play-style stories explore "The Lie that Caused Racism." Through the stories, children and youth get to explore the past and reflect on the legacy of racism in our lives through the lens of Christian faith.

Reflecting on my goals from last year, I can say that we are planning a Holy Communion education series for ages 5-8 during Lent 2024. We have also implemented Tell Me the Truth About Racism, as planned - a big thanks to Amanda and Celia.

Future goals include transitioning our junior youth group members into youth group for the fall and exploring ways to get them involved in service projects, as well. I would like the youth group to continue doing interfaith visits. And I need to recruit more volunteers to help me do all of this! I would love to talk with you about being a part of the children's and youth ministry team here at SPR.

MINISTRY REPORTS

20s/30s Group

In 2023, the 20s/30s group hosted social, spiritual, and service events, including board game nights, volunteering at the Greater Chicago Food Depository, a monthly life group, and a Holy Week viewing of Jesus Christ Superstar. We'd like to thank everyone who participated in our events, and we look forward to hanging out in the future!

Adult Formation

We enjoyed a wide range of adult formation offerings in 2023. Our Thursday Bible study continued to meet each week, and Sunday mornings included workshops on everything from our new Tell Me the Truth About Racism children's curriculum to the Bring Chicago Home ballot initiative to Advent wreath making to church members' stories of vocation. Small-group offerings included monthly Table Fellowship and life groups, as well as a Lenten series on Resurrection Hope: A Future Where Black Lives Matter, by Kelly Brown Douglas. In 2023, we look forward to expanding upon these offerings and offering a confirmation preparation class for adults.

Anti-Racism Working Group

Our anti-racism working group (ARWG) coordinates church-wide efforts to live into our anti-racism vision statement. In 2023, we resumed our work with Crossroads Antiracism Organizing and Training (CROAR) and hosted a three-day Crossroads training, From White Supremacy Toward Liberation: Building Shared Analysis to Transform Institutions. We are working on ways to welcome all to SPR, offering a "Blue Advent" service of lament and committing to hosting nametag Sundays monthly in 2024. We look forward to offering more programming and supporting the anti-racism efforts of other groups, including the music ministry, the Arts Committee, and Godly Play's Tell Me the Truth About Racism. – Sara Bigger

Arts Committee

The arts committee produces shows in the chapel to engage the parish in conversations using visual images as text. In 2023, we hosted two shows, both in person and online: *Epiphanies* (winter/spring) and JOY! (fall). We also expanded our exhibit space to include both the chapel and the parish hall.

Climate Justice

In 2023, our public electric vehicle charging station saw near-daily use. We also continued to update our indoor and outdoor lighting to be more energyefficient, thanks to our 2022 United Thank Offering grant. The vestry remains in conversation about ways to deepen our commitment to climate justice.

Faith in Action Team

The Faith in Action Team (FIAT) grew out of SPR's membership in the Community Renewal Society and serves as a platform for parishioners to work together on issues of social justice at the local level. In 2023, we made housing access our top priority, planning a three-part adult formation series on Chicago's housing history and organizing the parish around the Bring Chicago Home ballot initiative. Our housing equality efforts will continue in 2024. We also responded to the migrant crisis; these efforts transitioned into the new Migrant Project. - Sara Bigger

Fiber Arts

The fiber arts group is a loosely organized group of knitters and crocheters who make prayer shawls for ill church members and baby items to welcome new infants to the congregation. We look forward to continuing this ministry in 2024.

Food Pantry

The food pantry saw a substantial increase in guests throughout 2023, rising from an average of 40 to an average of 60 households each week. In partnership with the Greater Chicago Food Depository, the pantry provides guests with not only dry goods, but also fresh produce (some of it grown in the SPR garden), milk, eggs, and meat, in addition to providing services like voter registration. In 2024, we anticipate an increase in food pantry visitors due to the rising cost of food and Chicago's ongoing migrant housing crisis. We are grateful to all our volunteers and guests (and to those who are both).

Friends of Shoesmith

The Friends of Shoesmith ministry began in 2010 to support Shoesmith Elementary School, located across Kenwood Park from SPR. Based on input from the school, the first thing we did was to enrich their music program through the Chicago Children's Choir (now Uniting Voices Chicago). In 2023, we continued to focus on the school's outdoor spaces by tending the butterfly garden, assisting with vegetable growing, and beautifying the landscape. In 2024, we look forward to welcoming the Shoesmith choir at a Sunday worship service and resuming the annual parish bake sale to benefit Shoesmith's arts programs.

Garden Ministry

The food garden has seen reduced volunteer involvement post-pandemic, but still produced a substantial quantity of fresh vegetables and greens for the food pantry in 2023. In 2024, we look forward to rejuvenating the raised beds with a cover crop and continuing to grow lowmaintenance but healthy and delicious produce for our neighbors.

Haiti Ministry

The Haiti team continues to support our partner parish, St. Patrick's in Tom Gateau, Haiti. We focus our efforts on St. Patrick's School, raising funds for teacher salaries, school lunches, and the music program. In September 2023, we hosted a successful Haiti Sunday fundraiser, bringing in over \$29,000 for St. Patrick's. We have also been expanding our publicity for St. Patrick's, most recently publishing a video and accompanying article about the school's kitchen staff. Due to COVID-19 and ongoing civil unrest, we have not been able to travel to Haiti since 2019. We will continue our fundraising efforts in 2024, and we pray for an improvement in the situation in Haiti.

Junior Youth Group (grades 3 to 5) See the Children's & Youth Formation Report (p. 9).

Migrant/Refugee Support Ministry

In 2023, we reinvented our refugee ministry in response to Chicago's migrant housing crisis. Within the church building, we provided short-term emergency shelter to over 100 individuals who had recently arrived in Chicago from Venezuela and Colombia, as well as longer-term shelter for 7 individuals. We also provided funds to underwrite housing, utilities, and expenses for two additional recent arrivals. Our inaugural holiday gift fair raised over \$3,000 to support this ministry. In 2024, we hope to be flexible in responding to our newest neighbors' ever-changing needs.

Open Kitchen

The Open Kitchen ministry resumed operations in 2023, preparing monthly meals for the Kenwood United Church of Christ soup kitchen. We are grateful to all who contribute their time and cooking expertise to this effort.

Pastoral Care Team

In 2023, the pastoral care team stayed in contact with all parishioners by writing cards to honor birthdays, graduations, and anniversaries, as well as writing to those on our prayer list each month. We look forward to continuing this ministry in 2024. - Sara Bigger **St. Nicholas Choir (preschool to grade 2)** See the Children's Music Assistant's Report (p. 9).

TREASURER'S REPORT

Thank you. You gave to your SPR community to support our mission to mirror the radical hospitality practiced by Jesus. You gave to support what you believe in. We projected a total operating deficit of (\$160,271) in last year's budget and ended with a (\$89,043) operating deficit, over \$71,000 better than projected. We leveraged almost \$90,000 from our investments to continue running the programs you know, love, and support. I am grateful for answering the call in 2023. We are projecting (\$152,321) deficit for 2024's budget (see p. 20-23). I am asking you to consider deepening your commitment in 2024 to close this budget gap to \$0 so that we can continue to live our mission more fully, year after year.

Notes: The operating surplus/deficit is determined from figures reported on the "Operating: Statement of Activities" (available at sprchicago.org/financials) under the "Annual Budget vs. YTD Actual" column. The surplus or deficit is the difference between unrestricted revenue and operating expense. A surplus occurs when unrestricted revenue exceeds operating expenses. A deficit results when operating expenses exceed unrestricted revenue. Unrestricted revenue can be found under "Operations Giving Totals" and is \$567,210. Operating expenses are calculated by subtracting "Other Expenses" (\$187), "Dedicated Spending" (\$68,500), and "Non-Cash Expenses" (\$88,470) from "Expense Totals"

(\$813,410), which is (\$656,253). The difference between unrestricted income and operating expense is (\$89,043), which indicates a deficit because our expenses were more than our revenue.

Income and Expense

Unrestricted revenue for 2023 is \$45,210 more than budgeted. Total operating expense is \$26,018 less than budgeted.

Cash & Investments

On December 31, 2023, the parish had cash and investments of \$782,981; of that amount, \$556,669 was unrestricted, meaning that it is available to meet any parish need.

Notes: Parish cash and investments at the end of 2023 are reflected under "Operating: Financial Position" (available atsprchicago.org/financials) under the "Year to Date Balance" column. Total cash and investments were \$782,981. This figure includes monies for specific uses that remained unspent at year-end, such as 2024 pledges paid in 2023. Monies given to specific initiatives are accounted for as "Dedicated Accounts," which totaled \$226,312 at the end of 2023. The difference between Total Cash and Investments and Total Dedicated Accounts is the unrestricted cash and investments of the parish is \$556,669. 2024 pledges received in 2023 will be included in 2024 operating revenue and used to meet 2024 expenses.

GUIDE TO THE BUDGET

INCOME

Operations Giving

All revenue that can be used for any purpose, with the majority coming from pledge and plate donations from church members. "Space Use Donations" come from the partners who share our building and grounds. "Special Gifts" include grants and other one-time gifts, as well as pledge overpayments. "Miscellaneous Income" includes revenue from our electric vehicle charging station and any items that do not fit into the other categories.

Dedicated Giving

All gifts given for specific ministries, including our partnerships with Shoesmith Elementary School and St. Patrick's Church & School in Haiti, as well as the food pantry, music fund, garden fund, and other designated funds.

Non-Giving Revenue

All non-donation revenue, including stock dividends, event fees, and (in prior years) federal loan forgiveness.

Non-Cash Income

Unrealized gain on investments.

EXPENSE

Salary & Benefits

Personnel expenses for W-2 employees, including salaries, insurance, payroll tax, and pension payments.

Program Costs

Line items that support specific ministries, including worship, music, fellowship, formation, and outreach, and our partnerships with Brent House (the Episcopal chaplaincy at the University of Chicago) and the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago.

Communications & Administrative

Line items that support all ministries, including phone and internet, office supplies, postage, database expenses, and money set aside for financial auditing.

Building & Grounds

Routine maintenance, equipment purchase, and repairs for our building and grounds.

Travel & Expenses

Mileage reimbursement, continuing education, sabbatical allowances, and other professional expenses for staff.

Other Expenses Realized loss on stock sales.

Dedicated Spending

Disbursements from dedicated funds (discussed above), including those for Haiti and Shoesmith.

Non-Cash Expenses

Depreciation expenses and unrealized loss on investments.
