





About This Week's Music

Louis Vierne wrote the **prelude** in 1917, while he was serving as the organist of Notre-Dame de Paris, between 1900 until his death in 1937. The **anthem** by composer Jocelyn Hagen features a rhythm known as the "Scottish snap" or the "Lombard rhythm," where a short, accented note is followed by a longer, sustained note: as in the first occurrences of "known," "heard," and "God." The **postlude**, an arrangement of our closing hymn, is by The Rev. J. Berg Carlson, who published several volumes of organ works throughout his fifty years of ministry within the Lutheran church.
