What Is Lent?

Lent is a 40-day season of preparation for Easter. This preparation traditionally includes practices like fasting, almsgiving, confession of sin, and prayer. More broadly, it's a time for simplifying or reordering our lives in order to be more fully alive: One may give up something good in order to better appreciate it after Easter. One may give up something not-so-good in order to eliminate it once and for all from one's life. One may take up a new practice, like daily prayer, scripture reflection, or a service project, in order to find new grounding in the life of God.

Our Worship Space

At St. Paul & the Redeemer, we usually worship in the round, with the altar in the center and all of us gathered around it. In Lent, as you can see, we change things up. One reason we do this is simply for the sake of changing things around, because that's something that Lent is about: reordering our lives in order to wake up to ourselves and to the world around us a bit more—to unsettle us from our usual habits and perspectives.

The particular arrangement of our space in Lent reflects how many monastic communities worship. Such communities are places of service, fasting, and deep prayer. Lent is our chance to walk in such ways for a season. This arrangement also brings the choir into the midst of us, helping us to sing more boldly.

Giving in Lent

Our version of "almsgiving" at SPR is financially supporting the important work of two of our partners:

St. Patrick's School | Tom Gateau, Haiti

During Lent, SPR raises money for teachers' salaries at the school run by our partner parish, St. Patrick's in Tom Gateau, Haiti. Your generosity is appreciated: \$5 pays for a day of one teacher's salary; \$25 for a week; and \$100 for a month. (This is different from the money we raise for the St. Patrick's school lunch and music programs each fall.)

Shoesmith School | Kenwood, Chicago

SPR partners with Shoesmith School, our neighborhood elementary school, to support programming for students. This year the money raised will go towards enhancing the gardens & outdoor spaces at Shoesmith and for purchasing needed supplies for students.



Exodus 20:1-17

Then God spoke all these words:

I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me. You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or



1 Corinthians 1:18-25

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written,

"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. Glory to you, Lord Christ.



How to Line Up for Communion





About this Week's Music

Throughout Lent, the offertory anthems will center on the German Benedictine abbess and polymath Hildegard of Bingen (1098-1179). She was active as a composer, writer, philosopher, mystic, visionary, and as a medical writer and practitioner. She corresponded with the Pope, and she offered spiritual guidance to kings and gueens. As a composer, she primarily wrote chants for her and her fellow nuns to sing, either setting pre-existing liturgical texts, but more often her own writings. During her lifetime, harmony in music was just beginning, and she often incorporated a drone (a constant note or notes), in her music. Sapientia (Divine Wisdom) was a frequent presence in the ecstatic visions of Hildegard, and her O virtus sapientiae is a hymn to that Holy Wisdom, which, for her was the Divine Feminine Wisdom which nurtured the soul. The droning instrument is a shruti box, which is a more contemporary Indian instrument to the predecessors Hildegard would have used. Also throughout Lent, the **postludes** will be taken from the Lenten portion of Bach's "Orgelbüchlein" (Little Organ Book). Bach intended this work to include 164 chorale tunes to cover the entire liturgical year, yet completed only 46.
