Children's Formation

Children's Chapel, 10:15a-10:30a | During the sermon at the 10:00 service (9:15 service during the program year), children from **preschool to second grade** are invited to a special liturgy in the children's chapel, featuring songs and a Bible story.

Godly Play, 10:20-11:05a | Godly Play is our Montessori-based Christian formation program for children from **pre-K to fifth grade**. In Godly Play, we teach children the art of using religious forms of expression, including story, silence, and action, to articulate and wonder about the relationship they already have with God.

Some Helpful Things to Know Today

Can I receive communion?

Yes. Everyone, without exception, is invited to receive communion.

When am I supposed to stand?

At any point in the service, it's perfectly fine for you to remain seated as you're comfortable. We do have customary times when we stand or kneel; these are indicated by the italicized instructions throughout the service. There are also times when it is customary to cross ourselves, and if you wish to do so, the + indicates that.

Are children welcome here?

Yes. Children are invited to participate actively in the service. Also, coloring pages, crayons, and books are at the entrances to the church. Nursery care is available during the services for children ages 0-4. The nursery is down the southwest stairs. Changing tables are in the downstairs restrooms and the nursery.

Where are the restrooms?

There are single-user, gender-neutral restrooms down the southwest stairs and also through the northeast door of the sanctuary.

How do I find my way around?

Feel free to ask anyone to guide you! You can also pick up a building map at the Welcome Table, near the west entrance to the church.

Is there wheelchair accessibility?

Yes. An accessible restroom is through the northeast door of the sanctuary. There is an elevator which gives access to the first floor, lower level, and parish hall. Everyone is invited to remain seated at any point during the service, as needed.

How about hearing assistance?

We can help there, too. Hearing-assistance devices are available from the ushers.


Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.



The Haiti ministry partnership benefits the people of Tom Gateau and the SPR community. SPR members visit Tom Gateau annually and have been awed and humbled by the fortitude, grace and strength of the people there, who face many challenges due to lack of resources. The people of St. Patrick's are thankful for our church's generosity and willingness to reach out with help beyond borders.

SPR fundraises each September to support two programs at St Patrick's school, Haiti.

- 1) The lunch program for students throughout the school year: This year we hope to expand the lunch program from four days per week to five days per week. For \$140, a child will receive lunch five days a week for the entire school year. Currently there are 170 children enrolled.
- 2) Music program: SPR supports the salary for the music teacher. \$240 pays for the music teacher each month.
