



1 Peter 2:2-10

Like newborn infants, long for the pure, spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow into salvation—if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is good.

Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in scripture:

"See, I am laying in Zion a stone,

a cornerstone chosen and precious;

and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame."

To you then who believe, he is precious; but for those who do not believe,

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN.** 



#### **About This Week's Music**

Today's prelude, postlude, and choral anthem all come from Germany. The **prelude** and **postlude** come from a series of publications initiated by the Music Department of Concordia Teacher's College (River Forest, IL) in the late 1970s, entitled "Music for a Sunday Morning." Through this series they sought to address a perceived deficiency of non-hymnic, freely composed works for the organ. They commissioned the German composer and organist Harald Rohlig for their sixth volume in this series. After his studies in Bremen, Germany and England, he settled in Montgomery, Alabama, where he served as Director of Music at St. John's Episcopal Church. The **offertory anthem** comes from Brahms' Ein Deutsches Requiem (A German Requiem), which premiered in Bremen in 1868. Brahms assembled the texts himself, choosing not to follow the order of a standard Latin requiem. He drew primarily from the Luther Bible, seeking to give hope to the living, rather than focusing on the dead. The title describes the sung language of the work, rather than whom it was written for: Brahms is said to have contemplated an alternate title to avoid this confusion:

Ein menschliches Requiem (A Human Requiem).
